#### Dear Fellow Redeemed:

In this month in which we celebrate again our God given freedoms as one nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all, I would like to share the following thoughts with you from our Bible Study of a few days ago.

The beautiful women in my life and I had to agree that the world in which we live seems to be changing faster than ever before. In the past twenty-five years, there has been huge change – politically, economically and technologically – compounded by this Covid 19 pandemic that is still having quite the impact on our lives as it seems to be the excuse for much of what is taking place. As I often say, I am glad I am a short timer. As you have read these past couple of sentences, you may have noticed that I left out one very important aspect of our life as a child of God – the spiritual. The spiritual climate in our great land, and in our world is nothing to write home about right now. So the question needs to be asked, as least I think it needs to be asked, how can we change the spiritual climate of our family, our church family, our community, our state, our nation, and ultimately our world?

May I suggest that we read Proverbs 14:25-35, especially verse 34 which says:

<sup>34</sup> Righteousness exalts a nation, but sin is a reproach to any people.

In other words, Sin destroys a nation. Righteousness exalts a nation.

What does this righteousness look like?

### 1. Peace with God

Righteousness is ours as we are at peace with God. St. Paul says in Romans 5:1, *Therefore, since we have been justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ.* This peace with God makes us confident as we go about His work in the places He places us and the opportunities He gives to us to serve Him as we serve others.

#### 2. Peace with others

If possible, so far as it depends on you, live peaceably with all. (Romans 12:18) Right(eous) relationships with others are characterized by righteous words and actions. First, our words are to be truthful rather than deceitful for A truthful witness saves lives, but one who breathes out lies is deceitful. (Proverbs 14:25).

Second, our actions are to display a desire for the well-being of others. Be patient rather than quick-tempered. We read in Proverbs 14:29, *Whoever is slow to anger has great understanding, but he who has a hasty temper exalts folly.* Be kind to those in need. We read in Proverbs 14:31, *Whoever oppresses a poor man insults his Maker, but he who is generous to the needy honors him.* 

#### 3. Peace with ourselves

Righteousness involves a right relationship with ourselves. You can know *peace*. We read in Proverbs 14:30, *A tranquil heart gives life to the flesh, but envy makes the bones rot*. Anger, lack of forgiveness, envy and jealousy can damage your physical body. Getting rid of the bad stuff in your life and having a *tranquil heart*, a heart at peace, is good for your health.

Ultimately, this *peace* comes from being content about both the present and the future. Proverbs 4:32 reminds us that *the righteous finds refuge even in his death*. As this portion of Scripture makes very clear, for those who fear the Lord (have a proper respect for the Lord), He is our refuge in the present (v.26) and the future (v.32b).

In the fear of the Lord one has strong confidence, and his children will have a refuge.

(Proverbs 4:26)

. . . the righteous finds refuge in his death. (Proverbs 4:32b)

Lord, I pray that on all levels that this great land, whose independence we celebrate this month, will turn back to You, and that Your name will be respected and confessed. In the powerful name of Jesus I pray. Amen!

### **BIBLE STUDY REMINDERS, Just one more time!**

A re-energized small group Bible Study meets on the second Sunday of the month. They are studying a book dealing with **Spiritual Warfare** as it plays out in our lives, in our homes, in our church, and in the lives of those we love. The book is entitled "I **Am Not Afraid: Demon Possession and Spiritual Warfare.**" You are all invited to join us on July 11<sup>th</sup> at 5:00 p.m. in the Multipurpose Room in the Family Activity Center. Let me know you are coming and I'll get you a book.

Another new study group has a desire to dive more deeply into the Word of God. They ventured out to start a new group. (Might I add that this has been the idea behind this whole Cell Group ministry since we came, namely to start more and more study groups along the way.) Anyway, this new group is studying "How to Read the Bible with Understanding". Reading the Bible with understanding is not about merely learning the history of God's people or the storyline of great literature. Instead, God desires readers to understand the facts in light of His salvation plan for the whole world. This group will gather next on the 15<sup>th</sup> of August beginning at 5:00 p.m. (Their usual meeting date in July was taken by the Picnic, thus the change.) The promise is to have a very meaningful study of how to study the Word of God, to have time building relationships with others, and to have you on your way by 7:30 p.m. so that your family can get ready for the events of the new work and school week.

The third new study group that has started in the past few weeks is made up of some of our newer members who just finished Adult Confirmation Class and wanted to keep studying in a planned and systematic way. They chose a study entitled, "Clearly Christian: Following Jesus in this Age of Confusion". As I write this I have just finished reading the first chapter and it hits the nail on the head of what we are living right now. The bottom line is that in this age of counterfeits and fakes, the world desperately needs clear Christianity: the real love and forgiveness of God, who is the Savior for real sinners. This book would be a good study for anyone, especially those who have children, who live in this confusing world where truth and lies are all mixed into one deadly soup. This study group is going to meet once a month on the fourth Tuesday of each month, beginning at 6:00 p.m. to study together. They will meet next on June 22<sup>nd</sup> at James and Faye Morrow's home.

Add to that yet another new study that meets each Wednesday evening beginning at 6:30 p.m. They have chosen to study a book entitled "Creedal Apologetics: Learning to Use the Apostles' Creed to Defend and Proclaim the Christian Faith." It is a fancy sounding name, but bottom line, this book leads us to consider how we can use the much loved, and well-known Apostles' Creed to stay on topic and bring out the essentials of the faith in a concise and graceful manner as we share our faith with others. In this study, the Apostles' Creed, is dusted off, polished up, and sharpened so that today's Christians can defend and proclaim the great gospel of Jesus Christ to a world in desperate need of the forgiveness of sins and new life in his name. The forward was even written by one of our newer family members, Dr. Eric Rachut. What a small world.

Add to that another group of folks who are going to begin reading the book "The Pursuit of God" by A.W. Tozer. To give you a thumbnail of this book, "As the deer panteth after the water brooks, so panteth my soul after thee, O God." This thirst for an intimate relationship with God, claims A.W. Tozer, is not for a select few, but should be the experience of every follower of Christ. Here is a wonderful study of the inner life by a heart thirsting after God. Here is a book for every child of God, pastor, missionary, and Christian. It deals with the deep things of God and the riches of His grace. In "The Pursuit of God", Tozer sheds light on the path to a closer walk with God.

Add to that the fact that it is time to begin meeting together as a CLASSICS group and I can say this is an exciting time in the devotional and Bible study life of St. Paul Lutheran Church, The Grove.

And finally, because this is already way too long, we share with you some initial plans for this Fall and Wednesday evening Bible studies for the ladies. It has been discovered that one study option is not meeting the needs and the learning styles of many of our ladies. With that in mind we are pondering offering two Ladies Evening Bible Studies each Wednesday evening once school begins again. Like I said, I don't know what that looks like yet, but the gears are turning.

So, even though it had seemed, to me anyway, as if this part of the ministry had come to a standstill in regard to what we could do together, the Holy Spirit has opened some incredible doors for us to continue leading down this path of wanting more Bible Study opportunities and more participation in group Bible Study in this family of faith we call St. Paul Lutheran Church, The Grove.

Thanks for hanging in there with me during this long article. I look forward to seeing each of you in one of these studies, or in another one you would like to suggest.

# Rebekah's Christian Preschool is now enrolling for Fall!


Small, Christian learning environment in Temple. The first day of class will be August 9, 2021. There are only 4 openings currently available for children ages 2-5\*.
